Public Safety Report - Quinn Pratt-Cordova

- PD News (General): The third drone was installed on top of the PD, improving coverage, especially on the south side of the city.
- Drones: are showing up on scenes before patrol officers, providing real-time information and clearing calls for service daily. The hope is to have six drones across the city.
- Crime Trends Car Theft: Cautioned residents about leaving cars running ("puffing") in the morning to warm up, as thieves look for the smoke. Vehicles without automatic lock/start are technically illegal to leave running unattended.
- Crime Trends Jugging: Warned about a new trend where thieves watch people at ATMs (including Brinks armed cars) and wait for them to walk away with money before attempting a robbery. Advised using indoor ATMs and being watchful of surroundings.
- Community Action Team (CAT) / Crisis Response: Two new agents are joining the CAT team. They will primarily work with the Crisis Response Team and mental health co-responders.
- Mental Health Co-Responders: Hiring three additional co-responders, bringing the total to five licensed mental health clinicians, plus three agents total (two new, one existing). This will increase service for mental health case management.
- Motel Inspection Program: The program is going well. The number of inspections has decreased significantly (first one this year, compared to 4-6 previously), indicating improved business practices at the motels. The current inspection is for a motel with new ownership. Calls for service are trending downwards at motels.
- Timeline for New Mental Health Responders: Stated the hiring timeline is "Soon," with interviews lined up.

Mayor's City of Lakewood Report (Mayor Wendy Strom)

- Election Results (Day after election):
 - Ward 1: Congratulations to new Counselor Liz Black (also Executive Director of 40West).
 Only new councilmember starting this cycle.
 - o Ward 3: Congratulations to Counselor Ken Cruz (re-elected).
 - o Ward 4: Congratulations to Counselor Bill Furman (re-elected).
 - o Ward 5: Congratulations to Counselor Paula Nystrom (re-elected).
- Budget: The budget is finished. No government closure or layoffs. Projects will see some elongation, but no service cuts. Praised Lakewood's money management.
- CAT Team/Crisis Support: Noted that the growth of the CAT team is a direct response to council prioritizing this work over the last couple of years.



- Zoning Process: The new zoning code did pass, but petitions are being circulated. It is possible this will come back as a ballot election in the mail in the next 2-3 months. Residents should pay attention and reach out with questions.
- Emory School/Action Center:
 - Voted to purchase the Emory School property from Jeffco Schools.
 - Voted to sell the school building to the Action Center, while keeping the surrounding land. The building will become a family resource hub.
 - Voted to purchase the property where the Action Center is currently located. The Action Center will rent it back for a couple of years for renovations at Emory.
 - The intention for the former Action Center property is to create the next step in the housing spectrum, moving from the Navigation Center (immediate, 103 people) to a form of Permanent Supportive Housing (affordable component/next step to traditional housing). This will be a long process.

Jeffco Commissioner's Report (Commissioner Leslie Dahlkemper)

- Emory/Action Center: Gave a huge shout-out to Mayor Strom and the Lakewood City Council for the transformational work on Emory and the Action Center.
- SNAP Benefits (Federal Impact):
 - o Frozen benefits are affecting 38,000 Jeffco residents (13,000 children).
 - o Monthly, \$7.6 million in SNAP benefits are distributed to vulnerable families.
 - The county approved \$250,000 in emergency funding to go directly to food banks, with the Action Center serving as a distribution hub.
 - o Call to Action: Monetary donations are incredibly helpful. Food drives are ongoing.
 - Resource: The federal impact and drive locations are listed on Jeffco.us (scroll down to "Federal Impact" tab, updated daily).
 - o Judges recently ruled against the administration's push to freeze SNAP, which will release about \$6 billion in funding, with some eventually coming to Colorado.
- Head Start: Federal funding for Head Start is being watched closely, as over 100 programs in the U.S. are in danger of closing. Jeffco runs programs in Lakewood (in collaboration with the city), Arvada, and Wheat Ridge.
- Early Childhood Council: Jeffco, Clear Creek, and Gilpin counties are seeking applicants. The deadline is the end of today.
- Crime: The Jeffco Sheriff's (Reggie Marinelli) report showed that crime continues to decrease across the county.
- Wildland Fire Program: Continuing to build out the new program, noting that Jeffco's wildfire risk is about 9% higher than other counties.
- Community Survey: Invited participation in the Jefferson County 2025 Community Survey (10 minutes, anonymous). Information is on the Jefferson County Government Facebook page.

West Metro Fire Rescue Report (Fire Chief Jeremy Metz)

- Introduction: Introduced himself as the new Fire Chief, starting on August 1st. Noted 28 years with West Metro.
- Call Volume: Seen an almost 20% increase in calls for service in the last six years due to population density.
- Future Stations: A third-party study recommends adding 2-3 fire stations over the next 10-15 years.



- Secured property on Wadsworth for one station (will make 18 total). Proposed construction for this station is in the budget.
- Financial Sustainability: Changes in state legislation have grossly eroded special districts' ability to collect property taxes (funding has gone down as home values have gone up). Seeking long-term sustainability measures over the next six months.
- Capital Cost Increases:
 - o A standard fire engine cost \$619,000 in 2019, now costs \$1.2 million (nearly double).
 - o Cardiac monitors have gone from about \$25,000 to almost \$60,000.
- Federal Funding Concerns: Noted reliance on federal contracts (Federal Center, NREL) and concerns about reductions in Medicaid/Medicare funding recovery, and the future of FEMA grants (Assistance to Firefighters, Staffing Support).
- US&R Team: West Metro hosts one of the 28 FEMA Urban Search and Rescue Task Forces (federally funded, no local tax money). The continued federal funding of this program is a big question.
- Wildland Fire: Tom Willis is the Wildland Fire Mitigation Specialist, an important resource for the community.

Deane Elementary/School Connect (Interim Principal Jim McKenny)

- District Initiative: "School Connect" is a district initiative, based on an Arizona model, to shift partnerships from transactional (bagels and backpacks) to relational. It focuses on connecting faith, business, and civic partners to schools.
- Deane Elementary: A Title One school with high free/reduced lunch, significant needs (SSN) program, and high multilingual/BIPOC population (80% Hispanic, 30% multilingual learners).
- Achievement Data: The school is currently a "performance school" because it is *growing*, but bottom-line achievement data shows the majority of kids are not at grade level (estimated 13 years away at current pace).
- Focus Areas for Partnership: Staff Wellness, Student Belonging, and Family Engagement.
 - Staff Wellness involves lightening their load, providing gifts, and walking alongside them (suggested commitment: 5 hours/month and \$250/year per partner).
- Cafes (Partner Meetings): These are opportunities for the school and its "village" to meet.
 - o Upcoming Cafe: Two more cafes are coming up (details not specified, but Rose Stein's is on Friday, November 14th at 9:00 AM).
- Jeffco Feeds Jeffco: Announced a food drive this Saturday, November 8th.

Lakewood Economic Development Report (Marcus Johnson)

- Staff News: Katie Faltys accepted a manager position for the Longmont Renewal area and is leaving this Friday. There is a going-away party at Ballmer Peak at 4:00 PM.
- Economic Stats (EDCC Conference):
 - o Colorado state GDP growth is moderating (forecasted 1.5% growth rate).
 - Anticipated budget shortfall of almost \$700 million.
 - o Good News: Almost an 8% increase in entrepreneur filings (business activity is up).
- Implications: Need to connect with and support local businesses more than ever.
- Housing/Office Market: Housing market is stabilizing. The office market is very soft.
- Non-Profit Brunch: Invited attendees to a non-profit brunch today at 12:00 PM.

- o Ice Rink: The ice rink opens for the season that night (Friday, November 21st).

- Emory Elementary: About 75% done with the capital campaign for the purchase of the school.
- Holiday Program: The holiday program has begun. The deadline to sponsor a family is December 3rd. Drop-off and pick-up will be at Emory Elementary.
- Construction: Construction starts tomorrow (sponsored by LBA and West Metro).
- SNAP/Food Needs: Seen a huge increase in need; served over 75 more families on Monday alone. Appointments are required, but walk-ins are provided with emergency groceries. Open 8:30 AM to 3:30 PM (includes clothing services, no appointment needed).
